n 2021, our country and world faced unparalleled challenges. The pandemic spared no one and no place and, in fact, set progress back in much of the developing world. Our hearts are with all those on the front lines—at NGOs, in the medical community, in the armed services, and elsewhere—who deliver life-saving food, supplies, treatments, and other goods to those impoverished across the globe.

Since 1990, the Palmer Foundation has awarded domestic grants to more than 400 distinct 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations, primarily in Midwestern and Mid-Atlantic states, as well as international grants to worthwhile organizations working in countries where family members have lived.

Throughout the years, as new generations of family members have joined our Board, our focus has accommodated their special talents, skills, and interests. This, we believe, is our privilege. The Palmer Foundation empowers people to reach their highest potential. We strive to be a catalyst for change. Our grants are focused on projects that are realistic, impactful, and measurable.

To that end, we made some significant investments in research, direct services, and litigation in 2021, including nine contributions to first-time grantees.

Today, we remain committed to ensuring that increasing numbers of people in America and in the developing world have access to clean water, sanitation and

hygiene (WASH)—areas responsible for a huge number of health problems. Too many in the world have little to no access to basic safe drinking water and facilities. Clean water is in short supply and is tomorrow's gold. Our Foundation is committed to helping where we can.

We also prioritize workforce development initiatives, particularly those that involve providing specialized training and skills for veterans, youth, those in trade school, and nursing. Again in 2021, our Foundation invested in new technology to equip facilities with the tools and training necessary to provide to those whose livelihoods will be improved with a new skillset and a good paying job.

In addition to focusing on WASH and workforce development, our Foundation made many other significant contributions to alleviate mental health burdens for veterans, to help children in India integrating from orphanages back to their families, to support shelters for battered women & children, and beyond.

It is with gratitude for all of our blessings that we are pleased to participate in the experience of philanthropy and share these acts with future generations.

The Foundation's board of directors decided to support competitive domestic and international grant proposals into perpetuity.


